Carlton Holmes is a pianist of exceptional talent, musicality, and creativity. His sensitivity and inventiveness has allowed him to be one of the most sought after musicians in the New York area. An increasing number of students seek him out because of his knowledge and experience.

Born in Michigan, raised in Seattle, Washington, and Albuquerque, New Mexico, Carlton's musical training began at the age of eight. After studying trumpet, then drums, Carlton picked up piano at age eleven. By the age of fifteen, Carlton was playing professionally. He also won several best soloist awards in the All State jazz band competitions during his youth.

Carlton Holmes' career in New York began after he completed his Masters degree at the Manhattan School of Music. He found himself playing diversified gigs, and soon became known as one of the 'Young Lions', playing with drum great Charli Persip for six years and beginning what is now a fifteen year relationship with Master drummer Michael Carvin. Along with extensive studio work Carlton also composed and performed for a number of film and television productions as well as Broadway.

In addition to leading his own bands, Carlton's performing and recording credit includes work with Lionel Hampton, Freddie Hubbard, Kenny Garrett, Branford Marsalis, Max Roach, Stevie Wonder, Diane Reeves, Regina Belle, Donald Bryd, Terumasa Hino, and many others. Carlton continues to play and record with drum sensation Cindy Blackman, saxophone great Carlos Garnett and guitarist Ronny Jordan.

Carlton is also an active educator of piano, music theory and keyboards for all levels of students. He maintains correspondence with students from around the world.

There is a buoyancy in the piano playing of Carlton Holmes, a lightness of step, a sense of intuition and flow that draws a listener in.

Whether it's working with John Farnsworth's sextet at Smoke in New York or with Michael Carvin's quartet at Cecil's in West Orange or on the latter's new CD — "Marsalis Music Salutes Michael Carvin" (Rounder) — the less-than-marquee-status yet decidedly gifted Holmes moves the

sound in an engaging manner. A native of Lansing, Mich., who was raised in Albuquerque, N.M., Holmes, 40, performs Thursday with his trio at Smoke, then joins Carvin's quartet Aug. 4-5 at Shanghai Jazz in Madison. He said his piano concept is based on being relaxed and letting the music he hears come out, with the goal of drawing listeners in.

"The idea is to let go, be utterly honest, execute how I feel at the moment," Holmes said from his home in Queens. "Music, at a high level, is beyond emotion. There's a kind of spirituality, universality, about it, which is why people respond. So I'm trying to pull people in, have them (metaphorically) on the stage, inside what we're doing."

Holmes started classical piano studies about age 10, and discovered jazz at 15. He names such masters as McCoy Tyner, Herbie Hancock, Thelonious Monk, Red Garland, and Keith Jarrett among his inspirations. At Smoke, he'll appear in a new trio with established colleagues: bassist

Brad Jones and drummer Donald Edwards.

The pianist and Jones have been playing for more than a decade, primarily with saxophonist Carlos Garnett. Holmes relishes the bassist's flexibility. "Whatever I do, wherever I go, he'll adjust accordingly," said Holmes, who has also recorded with Garnett, drummer Cindy Blackman and many others, though not yet as a leader. "So it's very free when we play, though not free music."

Holmes met Edwards working with guitarist Mark Whitfield in 2003. "Donald has a unique view of rhythm that ranges from past to present, from swing and before to hip-hop," he said.

Thursday, Holmes originals will be spotlighted. One might be "Eternal Justice," a modern-minded number that sways between a swing feel and an insistent straight-eighth note groove. Or perhaps "Waltz for Gina," which has been recorded several times — including by Carvin on his 1992 Muse CD, "Each One

Teach One" — or "My Isha."

"I wrote that in Istanbul in 1991, when I was playing a 20-week, six-night-a-week gig with Michael (Carvin)," Holmes recalled. "It's 20 bars long, and each chorus ends with a four-bar drum break."

Holmes wants to record with the trio. "I'm excited about it," he said. "I'm starting to hear a sound I haven't heard before."


Playing with Carvin is also top-rate in Holmes' mind. "We're going in the same direction, trying to achieve a kind of honesty with the music," he said. "As simple as it sounds, there's not a lot of people doing that."

Holmes said he admires Carvin for what he feels is "the space between the notes." "It feels vast to me, this space, even when the music moves quickly," he said.

The concept of space is another powerful aspect of Holmes' artistry.

When he moved to New York in 1986, after graduating from the University of Tulsa in Oklahoma, he said he had to "dig down deep."

"It took a long time to get that New York touch, which is to me a kind of relaxed quickness of execution, a space between the notes," he said. "You might hear that in my playing."



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
